#### Pastor's Message

Clint Ramos is an acclaimed Tony Award winning costume and set designer on Broadway. He worked on Violent, Sunday in the Park with George, Sweet Chariot and Once on This Island. When we're watching a play or a musical, we don't always think about the set or costumes that much. They set the tone for what we're watching, but we turn our attention on the acting, singing and dancing. We act as if the set and costumes are secondary in the show itself. We walk away from the show saying "that was a neat set" and nothing more. In a recent interview, Clint was asked what he wished the audience might take away from his work. And he answered in an interesting way.

The set and costumes do more than set the tone for the show. The costumes and set are the first things that draw us into the event. Every button on an actor's blouse and brick on a fake backdrop wall are designed to draw the audience deeper into the story. The set and costume designer use their talents to draw the audience deeper into the story on the stage. And by bringing the audience into the story, the designers end up uncovering our personal stories and the story of the world beyond the walls of the theater. The set and costumes are clues inviting the audience to look around and see everything in a new light. Clint's only wish is for the audience, for those of us sitting in the seats, to be "more porous to those clues" that are all around them.

Imagine, for a moment, if we looked at our faith in the same way. What if we were more porous to noticing the God that is always with us? Look around you. In the set that is your everyday life, how are you being drawn deeper into Jesus' story? I tend to read my copy of *The Messenger* in my kitchen. I don't always think about how my dishwasher, the pile of dirty dishes in my sink and my dinged coffee grinder can reveal Jesus to me. But the God that created the universe is the same God who is living with you. The sets we build, our homes, offices and school lockers are places where God is truly present. We might struggle to see God in those places but maybe that can be changed. What's one small thing you could do to make the room you're in right now show God's love a little more clearly? Is there something you need to add or something you need to take away? Whatever you do, remember that Jesus is right there with you—but we can sometimes get in our own way when we try to see him.

This May, spend time helping yourself be more porous to the clues of love that God is always sending you. And let's re-design the sets in our lives to help us see God more clearly.



Genesis Garden Kicks Off

For over 30 years, we have provided hundreds of pounds of fresh produce to The Center for Food Action in Englewood, NJ each summer and fall. Families across Bergen County use the gifts we give to supplement their meals. Last year, 1682 lbs. of tomatoes, beans, cucumbers, egg plants and more were donated to CFA. It takes a team of dedicated volunteers to plant, tend, harvest and deliver this life giving food. And the month of May is when everything kicks off!

We're starting the season a little later this year. On Tuesday, May 15<sup>th</sup> at 6:30 pm we'll install the fence for beans and plant them. The rest of the garden will be rototilled the week after. We'll prep the ground with the tarp to keep out weeds and will start planting on May 29<sup>th</sup>. We'll bless the garden on June 3<sup>rd</sup>.

The use of our library has become more focused on Bible study, Lutheran history, other religions such as Islam, devotions, prayer, etc.so our collection is now focused on what our members seek.


We will still purchase a limited selection of fiction for our regular reader, but the focus will be on topics of current interest at Christ Lutheran.

#### From Worship Committee: Lent & Holy Week in Review

Thank you to everyone who reached out to members of the worship committee to share their thoughts and experience of Lent and Holy Week. On April 3, the committee met to discuss the season and make plans for next year. We value your feedback. One new thing we tried this year was moving our evening services to 7:00 pm instead of 7:30 pm. We were hopeful that an earlier start time might expand the possibility of who would be able to attend. However, we realize that the earlier start time created a time crunch for others. We'll return to a 7:30 pm next year for Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday and Good Friday.

Our 12 noon services for Ash Wednesday and Good Friday went really well. These services met in the chapel space and had their own unique liturgy. We'll keep these worship options for the foreseeable future.

Maundy Thursday is an important worship event that reminds us how Jesus wants us to treat each other and the wider world. We'll implement a few changes next year and encourage you to make plans to attend that service even if you've never attended that service before.

Kids, families and adults of all ages loved the intergenerational skit that took place on Palm Sunday at the 9:00 am worship. There's a real passion among our youth to share Jesus through plays and skits.

We received a few comments about the start of our Holy Week. It's the tradition at CLC to begin with a hybrid Palm & Passion Sunday. We start that day waving palm branches, celebrating Jesus' kingship, and end the day with Jesus' death and the making of a cross. This is an emotional service with highs and lows and everything in-between. It's not unusual to leave worship feeling disheveled and out of place. It's uncomfortable to see the cross. And that's why we start Holy Week in this way. As Christians, the cross is a central to our faith and Jesus' story. When we gather to worship, we are digging deep into Jesus' life, death and resurrection. We can't only wave palms and then head straight to Easter. We can't forget the reality of the cross. Since not everyone who attends church on Sunday will worship with us on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday, we read about Jesus' death on Palm Sunday so that everyone can see that there is no place that Jesus won't go.

Each autumn since 2009, a great assembly of artists and artworks has gathered in downtown Grand Rapids, Michigan for ArtPrize, an international competition with half a million dollars in prizes based on both jurors' assessments and popular votes. In 2017 ArtPrize drew 1,300 submissions from 41 states and 47 countries, displayed in 180 venues that ranged from art museums to bars and auto garages.

#### Can Dogs Go to Heaven?

The hand of the Lord came upon me, and he brought me out by the spirit of the Lord and set me down in the middle of a valley; it was full of bones. . .

He said to me, "Mortal, can these bones live?"

I answered, "O Lord God, you know."

(Ezekiel 37:1-3).

The day we put our dog down I held her head, caressed her face and called her my favorite nickname, Maggie-Moo. And then she stopped breathing. I cried and cried and cried.

My husband and I had tried to be honest with our kids about what was going to happen with Maggie without saying more than they needed to know. When our 6-year-old son left for school that morning and asked, "So when we come home from school, Maggie will have gotten a shot and died?" we said, "Yes."

Maggie had been my daily walking companion; she sat at my feet while I worked at my desk; and if you gave her a bone she'd wait until you weren't looking and bury it. Now she was gone.

The death of a family pet may be the first experience children have of loss. How do we as caretakers help them understand what happens after a loved one dies?

As we observe the season of Lent, this text from Ezekiel comes to mind: "Can these bones live?" Or, as children ask, "Can dogs go to heaven?"

Perhaps our answer need not be any clearer than the response we hear in Scripture: "Lord God, you know." Granted, Ezekiel wasn't talking about doggie resurrection but restoring God's people. And yet, I find the words still work. God's concern for life, and presence during death, comforts us beyond any specific scenario.


When the kids came home that day, Maggie wasn't at the door to greet them. In that moment, we held each other and cried.

Next I displayed pictures of Maggie and her dog collar in our home so we could sit with our grief rather than ignore it. We placed these treasured items where we would see Maggie throughout the day—under the cross, at the foot of Jesus.

Death teaches us to pay close attention to what fills our lives with joy and to count each day as a gift. My family still gives thanks for each day we had Maggie in our lives.

#### **Practices**

- Create a memorial in your house to hold your pet's favorite things to encourage continued conversation about your pet.
- Help other animals by donating unused heartworm or flea medications or other helpful items to an animal shelter (don't feel compelled to give away your pet's favorite things).
- Keep your pet in your family prayers (at mealtime or bedtime). There's no harm in continuing to pray for your loved one.

# **God's Plan for Me**By Louisa D. Groce



My journey to ministry started at age 12 as the teacher for the youngest children in Sunday school at my Lutheran church. Every Sunday during the doxology, I walked the neighborhood collecting children for class. I later realized I could never become a Lutheran nun or deaconess, nor teach in a Lutheran parochial school, because of my ethnicity.

Once I had children, I changed churches, eventually transferring to St. Luke Lutheran Church, Willingboro, N.J., unaware I was forsaking my Lutheran Church–Missouri Synod roots.

Dorothy Ricks, assigned by the Lutheran Church in America (an ELCA predecessor) to facilitate outreach at St. Luke, became a lifelong friend and mentor. When she was reassigned, I acquired a new title, associate in ministry, responsible for St. Luke's after-school program.

Years later she requested I shepherd a small congregation in south Philadelphia. My task was one of encouragement, revival, restoration and renewed hope. For six years I was "pastor" of Emmanuel Lutheran Church.

One Saturday morning, I opened a letter from the New Jersey Synod. E. Roy Riley, then synod bishop, had extended an invitation to do the impossible. I called and reminded him I was in my 70s. Would anyone my age be accepted as a student, especially by the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia?

God's answer was "yes." I completed my studies at age 80 and accepted a call to Redeemer Lutheran Church in Jersey City, N.J. It was an unimaginable privilege to serve this community as an ordained minister for 10 years—one of God's miracles.

During my 99 years of life, I have seen God sweep aside barriers of ethnicity, gender and age to help me become a pastor of Christ's beloved people.
