

When was the last time you felt ash?

I don't have a fireplace in my house or a fire pit in my yard, so my ash making is limited. But you might find me this month in our *Genesis Garden*, hovering over a pile of burning palms from last year's Palm Sunday service. The start of Lent is February 18 which means that Ash Wednesday is here.

Ash Wednesday is an old tradition that Lutheran churches have gradually revived in their services. On this day, we reflect on what ashes represent in Scripture: repentance. Job repented "in dust and ashes" (Job 42:6) while Daniel pleaded to God "with fasting and sackcloth and ashes" (Dan 9:3). Repentance, the act of turning back to God and admitting one's failure, sins, and shortcomings, is given a tangible element by the wearing of ashes. The ashes remind us that we are mortal and prone to failing to live the full lives God desires for us. Adam, the name of the first human being, comes from the Hebrew word adamah, meaning soil. By wearing ashes, we are reminded that we come from the earth and are part of God's fertile creation. Our repentance is admitting that we fail to be the good soil or fertile ground for our neighbors. Instead of helping them thrive and grow, we conserve and keep for ourselves. Instead of sharing and turning to others in love and service, we focus on what we need and put our trust in what we can acquire, manage, or control. Instead of being part of God's fertile soil, we stifle the fertility and creativity around us. Ash Wednesday is about needing repentance in our lives. But Ash Wednesday also serves as a reminder that we are not alone on this earthly journey. When ashes are placed on our head, we receive them in the shape of a cross. We are reminded that our baptism unites us with Jesus. He lived a complete human life which led him to the Cross. Although we might not be fertile ground for our friends and strangers, we are joined with the One who is a fertile ground for our love, trust, and faith. We might not be a source for life that we should be but we are joined, guided, and helped by the One who is.

I invite you this Ash Wednesday to join us for worship at 7:30 pm. If you've never had ashes placed on your head, come and experience something new. In Jesus, God embraced your mortality and, in your baptism, God embraced you.




The Care Committee

End Hunger Now... Packing over 80,000 meals to fight hunger in Bergen County

On Martin Luther King, Jr. Day, 18 members of Christ Lutheran Church joined 250 other volunteers at Advent Lutheran Church in Wyckoff to package over 80,000 healthy meals. In an assembly line, soy, macaroni, cheese, and other ingredients were packed in bags, sealed, and stored in boxes to be shipped to the Center of Food Action (CFA). The CFA works in Bergen County to make sure that all who need food receive it. Volunteers of all ages were involved. On this National Day of Service, we shared God's promise that love wins. Thank you to everyone who came out and we look forward to participating in this event again next year!

Special Gifts Disbursement Committee Seeks Approval

The Special Gifts Disbursement Committee and the Congregational Council have reviewed and approved 13 new projects. Your approval by secret ballot will be requested at the annual meeting in February. A total of \$48,555 will be distributed from the Dominick Ricci Fund if approved.

Project descriptions:

- Donation to the family of Lily LaRue Anderson who is suffering from Diffuse Intrinsic Pantine Glioma (DIPG) a rare aggressive tumor of the brain. For medical care and travel. \$ 2,000.00
- Vacation Bible School. Includes curriculum, supplies and paying for staff (including required background checks). \$ 5,000.00
- Special sheet music and musicians for Easter & Christmas 2015. \$ 4,500.00
- Exterior painting of CLC buildings, includes paint and labor. \$ 5,000.00
- Two (2) Rock 'n' Play bassinets for Infant nursery for babies to sleep or sit.
 \$ 150.00
- Gift to ELCA Fund for Leaders. The endowment fund provides scholarships for seminarians. \$1,000.00
- Initial accrual for air conditioning. Air conditioning will increase attendance at summer worship services (\$30,000 estimate). \$10,000.00
- Bible Study program. \$ 200.00
- Funds for the Lutheran National Youth Gathering in Detroit in July 2015. 100% of expenses for Pastor Marc, 50% of expenses for 4 others. \$ 2,425.00
- Ebola disaster relief (second donation). \$ 2,500.00
- Rework of the Sonshine Kitchen. Add new oven, microwave and counter top.
 \$ 7,500.00
- Two (2) round tables (each 5 foot diameter, speckled grey color) for church use. \$ 718.00
- Emergency Fund (balance of money received in 2014 not allocated to other projects). \$ 7,562.70

The Charter for the Special Gifts Disbursement Committee requires that a minimum of 10% of funds be distributed to the following 4 areas. If all new recommendations are approved, then the actual distribution for the year will be as follows:

- 1. Outreach Ministry or Benevolences to local Community or worldwide 18%
- 2. Special Congregational Ministries 34%
- 3. Capital Improvement or Asset Replacement 30%
- 4. Mortgage Principal Reduction 10%

When a special (\$100,000) distribution is received, per the charter of the Special Gifts committee, 10% of that special distribution goes to the CLC endowment fund. This has already been allocated to the fund.

The Dominick Ricci Foundation was established in 2009 and supports many organizations in northern New Jersey. Each year Christ Lutheran distributes money received from the Foundation to support ministries at Christ Lutheran and around the world.

In November 2014, \$66,00 was disbursed with over \$28,000 sent to programs outside of our church. This money is not used for normal operating expenses of the church but to share God's love in the world.
