



In-between

January can feel like an in-between kind of month in the church. We just finished Advent and Christmas and we're taking a breather before Ash Wednesday and Lent. The church collects itself before the deep spirituality and religiosity of Lent comes into view. It's like the green paraments we hang on the pulpit, walls, and altar, reminding us of warmer and more pleasant times when polar vortexes and shoveling snow are distant memories and only the warmth of summer fills our lives.

The green of January reminds me of something that I struggle with. The color green reminds me of life and, like the season of Spring, rebirth. There is a continual theme in our Christian story of people and situations being renewed, recharged, and reborn. Baptism, itself, is a rebirth. The adult, child, or infant are given a new name and a new identity as a child of God. They are made brand new even though they look, and possibly feel, just like they did before. Even though no outward change is visible, we proclaim that they have been changed because they have been claimed by God. And whatever is claimed by God never remains like it was.

But rebirth or renewal in our own lives can be very hard to see. Each day brings new struggles or continuations of old ones. New struggles replace ones we just overcame. When we're in the middle of our lives, it's hard to see transformation happen. It's hard to create an opportunity to cultivate transformation as well. The experience of rebirth and renewal is not just a passive experience. Like the farmer's fields, we're invited to cultivate and nurture our faith life.

One of our expectations for the youth in Confirmation class is to read, along with their families, the Gospel According to Mark. The shortest of the 4 gospels, Mark is the text we're engaging with this year in worship. I invite you to engage with it as well. Open your bible and read. Create an opportunity to cultivate your experience of renewal and rebirth. Walk with the confirmands and their families as they explore the Gospel of Mark together. During the year, we'll post comments and questions on our Facebook, Instagram, and Twitter accounts. I invite you to join in the conversation and see how the Holy Spirit is renewing your life.

In this in-between month, resolve to embrace God's claim on you.

The Care Committee





\$193 per pledger for insurance

\$135 per pledger to keep the property clear of snow

\$68 per pledger for education, youth, and outreach

Worship and Christ Women Complete Mission Projects!

Lutheran Social Ministries of NJ has two very worthwhile projects—the Grocery Bag Project and the Hygiene Kit Project. In mid-December LSM picked up 48 grocery bags, each filled with over 20 grocery items which will be distributed to low income seniors within the LSM ministry. Many thanks to members of the congregation who helped us shop for the over 1000 items needed to complete the project.

CLCW completed 48 Hygiene Kit bags. We used the beautifully decorated canvas bags created during the Advent Dinner. (Many thanks to all you creative people who decorated them.) Some of the products included were toothbrushes, towels, wash cloths, shampoo, disposable razors and deodorants, etc.

In early December we delivered 25 Christmas-at-Sea satchels to St. John's Lutheran Church in Clifton which was the drop off point. They each were filled with clothing and treats for an entire crew of a seafarer's merchant ship. This project of the Seafarers International House of New York City is supported by The ELCA.

We are grateful to Care Committee, Christ Women and the Ricci Special Gifts Fund for the monetary support of these projects.
