

# What does eternal life look like?

I've been thinking about this question during the last two months. We've been in the gospel according to John for most of April and May and 'eternal life' keeps popping up. In fact, one of the most favorite verses from scripture, John 3:16, mentions "eternal life." So what does eternal life look like?

We might say that eternal life means "never" dying and that it's an opportunity for immortality. Eternal life is the next step in our journey through God's creation. We're born into the world, spend the next decades living our lives as human beings, and then die, only to transform into a slightly better, and more immortal version of our past self. We'll spend forever in our favorite shirt, drinking our favorite beverage, while relaxing on our own private beach in heaven.

But that isn't necessarily the vision of 'eternal life' that Jesus talks about. In a reading we heard last year, Jesus is praying right before he's arrested. He's prepping his disciples for his eventual resurrection and ascension into heaven. Jesus asks his Father to protect his disciples. He also asks that God help his disciples to love as he loved. And in the middle of this prayer, Jesus describes eternal life. Eternal life is knowing, and being known, by God (John 17:1-3). There's no talk about a life after death. There's no mention of heaven. Instead Jesus says in one short verse that eternal life is knowing God and knowing Jesus. That's it.

That feels a little simple, doesn't it? Yet I find grace in Jesus' words. His words show that eternal life can't be separated from our current life. We don't need to think of eternal life only something that happens after we die. Jesus knows us and we know Jesus even if we are sometimes confused by what Jesus is doing - or not doing - in our lives. And since Jesus continues to make himself known through worship, readings, and holy communion, we're have eternal life. Eternal life isn't about what comes next; eternal life is about our lives right now. So if we have eternal life, just what is God calling our lives to look like today? See you in church!

# Teaching Children to Pray

During a recent Christian Education meeting at our church we were discussing how to nurture strong faithful lives of children and families. One of the questions we asked each other was what would we like our children to learn at various ages. One of the topics we readily agreed upon was that we would like our children to learn how to pray. We want them to develop a relationship with God through their own conversations with him. We want them to know that God hears all their prayers and answers them in his own time and in his own way. Many of us noted that even as adults we are not always comfortable praying, particularly aloud or with other people listening to us. Most of us also said we wished we had learned to pray earlier. All agree how important it is to know that someone has been praying both for you and with you at different times in our lives. What a comfort to children to know that their prayers count, that others will pray for them and with them, and that Jesus is their best friend forever.

So how do we start, if we are not already praying with our children. Here are a few ideas shared by Cheri Fuller from Lifeway Magazine:



Let your children know that prayer is simply being with God and having a conversation. Assure them they can talk to God just like they can to mom, dad or a best friend. God is always ready to listen no matter where they are—home, school, church.

Be sure your children hear *you* praying. You can pray for them at bedtime or in the morning asking God to watch over them and for their heart to be filled with love. Thank the Lord for something specific such as a gift or talent in your child.

Share with your child a time that you prayed and received the answer in a surprising or dramatic way.

Pray on the spot: the next time your child comes to you with a problem or worry, instead of saying, "I will pray for

you", do it right then. You will be demonstrating the important principle that God wants us to cast all our concerns on Him and pray about everything.

It is amazing what we learn by sharing prayer time with our children. Not only do we hear their joys and concerns, but their simple and unrehearsed prayers can help us to see that we are blessed beyond our own realization. Praise to God!
