Pastor's Message

15. 1500. 30,000. What do these three numbers have in common? They show how we are part of something bigger than ourselves.

June is a month where we will celebrate just how connected we are. When Jesus claimed us in our baptism, he did more than connect us to himself. He united us with everyone else whom he claimed as his own. Our faith is designed to be a team sport. We cannot follow Jesus on our own. We need others to pray for us. We need others to support us. We need others to love because Jesus loved us first. We are called to be people who connect, forming a community that is even bigger than Christ Lutheran Church's walls.

On June 3rd, we will hold a special congregational meeting to discuss what it takes to be a community of faith. We'll have one worship service at 9:30 am. Our congregational meeting will take place immediately after. After the meeting, we will then bless our Genesis Garden. The Genesis Garden is in its 33rd year. Together, we will raise over 1500 lbs. of fresh produce to donate to the Center for Food Action in Englewood. When we work together, we make a real difference.

On June 10th, Lutheran youth (8th grade and up) from around Northern New Jersey will attend our 9:00 am worship. Afterwards, they'll share brunch and go for a hike nearby. The first meeting of this new initiative met in May at Calvary Lutheran in Allendale. Youth from CLC had a great time, even discovering classmates at their schools who were Lutherans, just like them. We can't wait to welcome these amazing kids to CLC.

On June 17th, we'll honor all graduates as we start our summer worship schedule. We're proud of everyone who completed their schoolwork and are now taking that next step in their lives.

And finally, on June 24th, we'll host our annual Blessing of the Animals. We'll worship in the Opsal (Fellowship) Hall. All critters, large and small, are welcome to attend. If your pet friend doesn't like large crowds, feel free to bring a picture (even if it's on your phone), and I'll say a blessing over it. We'll also celebrate our youth and adults who will be attending the ELCA Youth Gathering in Houston where over 30,000 people will gather for worship, service and fun.

This is a month where we will connect as a community. This is a month where we will see how we can do so much when we are together. I can't wait to see you as a part of it.

NJ Synod Assembly Re-Cap

Dear Friends in Christ,

We are Lutheran. For the past year it has been "all Reformation all the time!" So now what? The Lutheran Confessions teach that God freely and graciously creates a trusting relationship between us and Jesus. As we gather to meet in synod assemblies, let us remember that our hope is in the living Christ and share that assurance with the joy of the gospel.

Through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, we are free of the burden of making ourselves acceptable to God. The cross of Christ and the living Christ assure us that God's final word for us is life and freedom in Christ. Lutherans confidently and enthusiastically claim this promise: "For freedom Christ has set us free" (Galatians 5:1). How does this claim affect your faith journey as an individual, a congregation, synod or member of the church universal?

The annual New Jersey Synod Assembly gathered May 11-12 in New Brunswick to discuss the business of our congregations, synod and the wider church. Over 350 people from 170 congregations gathered to worship and discover, together, how God is moving us as a church. Alyssa Osenbruck, Rich Osenbruck, Carla Hoenigmann, Deacon Abby Ferjak and Pastor Marc were our attendees from Christ Lutheran Church.

Every Synod Assembly includes a representative from the church-wide organization (aka—our denomination, the ELCA). This year's representative was Mikka McCracken, Director for Planning and Engagement with ELCA World Hunger. She shared greetings from the presiding Bishop, Rev. Elizabeth Eaton, and highlighted a few church-wide focuses. As the church moves into the future, the church-wide organization has adopted a series of directions called "Future Directions 2025." View the complete list by visiting www.ELCA.org/future. Over 30,000 Lutherans are preparing to attend the ELCA Youth Gathering in Houston on June 27-July 1 (including 3 from CLC!). The Capital Campaign for the ELCA is entering its final year and is more than 70% of its goal (view more at www.ELCA.org/campaign). The ELCA is also encouraging individuals and congregations to provide feedback on a future social statement on "Women and Justice." Read the draft at ELCA.org/womenandjustice.

Our New Jersey Bishop, Rev. Tracie Bartholomew, announced her 2018-2019 Bishop's Challenge: Changing the World, One Cow at a Time! One of the amazing things we participate in as part of the ELCA is the ELCA World Hunger organization. This organization works to end hunger in 46 US States and nations all over the world.

ELCA World Hunger does more than just alleviate hunger. The organization works to end hunger by providing tools and resources for communities to feed themselves. The Bishop is inviting congregations in New Jersey to increase their financial commitment to ELCA World Hunger. For every \$500 in increased giving (\$500 provides a family with one cow), a cardboard cow will be sent to our congregation. We'll decorate the cow and bring it back to next year's Synod Assembly to see the "herd" of change we created!

One of the ways synods inform the church-wide organizations about what we'd like to see done throughout the denomination is by sending the church a "memorial" that will be considered at a church-wide assembly (next one will take place in 2019). The NJ Synod voted and approved a memorial designed to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the ordination of women in the Lutheran Church (2020). The memorial also encourages congregations and synods to combat the sexism women clergy experience (waiting longer to find calls, lower salaries and more).

The Synod Assembly influences the work of the entire synod by discussing and voting on "resolutions." These resolutions are documents designed to encourage the vitality and ministry of individual congregations. This year, two resolutions were voted on and passed. One encouraged congregations to respond to gun violence by encouraging civic engagement to help congregations respond to the mass shootings, suicides, homicides, accidental shootings and acts of domestic violence that impact communities every day. The Synod also passed a resolution inviting congregations to support undocumented immigrants.

The Synod is administered by a synod council (just like how our church has a church council). Carla Hoenigmann was appointed to the council last year and was re-elected to a 3 year term. We're thrilled that Carla will be part of the team shepherding the New Jersey Synod.


The Man with the Golden Arm


Taco USA: How Mexican Food Conquered AmericaBy Gustavo Arellano

Our First Calling: Faith and Family

As graduation season looms, students of all ages may begin to wonder about their callings—what to do in high school; what major to study in college; what job to pursue.

Once I brought my confirmation class to an animal shelter where they met a volunteer who spends every weekend

cleaning cages. He believes deeply in his call to care for God's creatures, even if it's a dirty job. On the ride home, I asked my class about their callings. One shared her love of dancing; another said she loved writing and telling stories.

They then asked me about my calling. I replied: "My calling is right here. To be with you. To gather with the community week after week for worship. To love and be loved. To remind you that you are beloved children of God."

At another point in my ministry, I was invited to my alma mater to share my vocation story with students. As we talked, one asked: "What if I choose the wrong path? What if I go in one direction and find out later I was supposed to go in another?" Students were nodding their heads in agreement, asking the same question: "How do I know what's my calling?"

In every stage of our lives we're called to something. Sometimes we're unsure of what our callings look like. Other times we're excited and on fire for how we can use our spiritual gifts. Sometimes we need to backtrack. Yet through it all—the learning, questions, wondering and doubts—nothing is ever wasted. We're becoming more and more the person God calls us to be, missteps and all.

That night on campus, I reminded the students to remember their first calling. That in every joy and challenge, in following and leading, in wondering and worrying, we are first and foremost called as beloved children of God.

For this calling, we say: Thanks be to God!
