The Life-Changing Magic of Lent

I typically need to remind myself that there is a blessing in having stuff. When I step on a Lego with my barefoot, trip over the corner of a misplaced ottoman or bang my head on a ceiling lamp that is too low, I want to throw everything away. But having stuff is a problem I'm blessed to have. Too many people in our world and in our neighborhood do not have the stuff I have. Many spend their months trying to decide which bill to pay, which meal to skip or how they can make their old car last longer. Having stuff means I have resources at my disposal that others do not have. But it also means I run the risk in having stuff overwhelm, distort, and disrupt my life, relationships and spirituality.

As I prepare to lead a mid-week Lenten series on the Small Catechism, I have been reading books on decluttering. Marie Kondo's *The Life-Changing Magic of Tidying Up*, Ruth Soukup's *Unstuffed, Stuffocation, Spark-Joy, A Decluttering Handbook for Creative folks*, and *The Joy of Leaving Your Stuff All Over the Place*, are on my nightstand. Each book promises that we have the power to gain order and control over our lives. We can, through certain acts and habits, clear the clutter from our homes, relationships and soul. By looking at what we have, we can see ourselves more clearly.

When Luther put together The Small Catechism, he was offering parents and heads of households an opportunity to look at what they have. They, and we, have Jesus. Through the Ten Commandments, Apostles' Creed, the sacraments and prayers, entire families could discover Jesus' love for them and how Jesus' love changes everything. This Lent we're going to see how the The Small Catechism is more than just a book we teach to teenagers. It's a way to discover Jesus and live out our faith in a very real way.








Scout Sunday - March 12

"I will become a monk"

Martin Luther originally planned, on behalf of his own future and the future of his family, to become a lawyer. But something changed, and he soon became a monk. Below is a short selection from *Luther the Reformer*, available in our church library, about why that decision was made.

Six months later a thunderstorm overtook Master Martin while he was walking back to Erfurt [where Martin Luther was studying to be a lawyer] from Mansfeld [where Luther's parents lived]. A bold of lightning suddenly struck him to the ground. "Help me, St. Anne!" he shouted. "I will become a monk!"

One moment of triumph. Another of desolation. Now Master Martin had decided to enter a monastery, and father Hans was furious. Luther wrote to his father and declared that the thunderstorm and the vow were the will of God. Hans replied that he wondered whether his son had misinterpreted what had happened. Were the thunderstorm and the vow the work of God or the devil?...

Yet there was much more than this behind his father's anguished response, and Luther knew it. What Hans had lost was his insurance policy. With its brightest member now in a monastery, the Luder [Luther] family's security was gone. Luther responded that he could do more for his family with his prayers than he could as a well-heeled lawyer....

Luther's decision to become a monk nonetheless remains puzzling. At the time of the vow he was walking back to the University of Erfurt. He had taken an unexplained, but officially authorized, leave of absence to visit his family. This leaves suggests that the decision was not as sudden as a bolt of lightning that knocked him off his feet.

Tri-Boro Food Pantry - Lenten Hunger Appeal

On Sunday, February 5, Pastor Marc shared in his sermon some of the good work of the Tri-Boro Food Pantry. The food pantry serves over 100 families (95% from the Tri-Boro area itself) who need help with groceries, cleaning products and more. Every year, the food pantry tries to supply all the fixins' needed for three large meals at Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas. The pantry usually purchases everything it needs, but they're trying something different this year. Six different congregations are being asked to supply one food item to make the Easter meal fantastic. Pastor Marc volunteered our church to supply 70-3 lb. bags of onions. We don't have a date set for when we need the onions by, but Pastor Marc is confident we can help make 70 families in Park Ridge, Woodcliff Lake and Montvale have a great Easter meal.



Sunday School focuses . . .

... on a service project once a month. Recently the younger children made thank you cards for people who do special things for them. The older children baked cookies and delivered them to police, firefighters or neighbors as a thank you for helping to protect the children in the neighborhoods we live in. During the upcoming Lenten season we are inviting the children at worship to color large posters of the stations of the cross. Parents can participate, too. They will be displayed in the sanctuary during Lent. As the Sunday School children serve others they are learning that they are also serving Christ.

Long Road Ahead

In a host community in Jordan, a delegation of Global Mission staff met Jasmine, a widowed woman from Syria. She, like many others, fled to Jordan for safety with her sisters and her 2 young children. She had been offered the opportunity to be resettled in the U.S. "I denied the offer," she told us through an interpreter. "I thought I'd be back home [in Syria] by now." As time passed, and the conflict continued, she realized that she may not be going home anytime soon, and that she wishes she had taken the offer.

In late January, President Trump signed a series of executive orders that would hinder/halt immigration and migration to the United States. The order that garnered the most media attention essentially banned anyone from 7 countries where the primary religion is Islam — Syria, Iran, Libya, Somalia, Yemen, Iraq and Sudan.

With the signing of the Executive order, refugees, like Jasmine, are feeling less hopeful for new opportunities. Rachel Luce, Country Director for Lutheran World Federation-Jordan — Our partner for work in the camp and host communities in Jordan — told us that there has been a "palpable sadness" in the region. "They [Syrian Refugees] already felt like no one cared about them," she said. "But this blatant law against them has made them feel unwanted and further depressed."


The ELCA responded to the Executive Order through blog post, action alerts, social media, video and a statement from Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton, taking a firm stand in opposition of the string of Orders that would stop or greatly reduce the efforts of asylum-seekers, refugees, etc. In her statement, Bishop Eaton said, "I agree with the importance of keeping our country secure as the administration stated in its executive order last Friday, but I am convinced that temporarily banning vulnerable refugees will not enhance our safety nor does it reflect our values as Christians."

Matthew 25 says, "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me." The ELCA is committed to continued work with the most vulnerable.

Domestically, through congregations, partners such as Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services and Church World Services, along with several Lutheran social ministry organizations, the ELCA is committed to refugee resettlement in the United States.

Internationally, the ELCA continues to support internally-displaced persons (IDPs), migrants and refugees through the accompaniment of companion churches and partner organizations in Europe and the Middle East, and through the AMMPARO strategy that was approved through Church-wide Assembly last summer.


